

Tribal preference

20 units designated for low-income Indian households

First preference:

Head of Household is an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of the Siletz Indians, or the HOH is not an enrolled Siletz Tribal members, but the family includes a minor or dependent child who is an enrolled Siletz Tribal member

Second preference:

At least one member of the household is an enrolled member of another federally recognized tribe or qualifying state-recognized tribe



Affordability

 Projected gross Monthly Rent Per Unit at Nesika Illahee

13 Studios: \$924

30 1-Bedroom: \$990

9 2-Bedroom: \$1,188

7 3-Bedroom: \$1,371

- The rent to be charged may not exceed 30% of the household's adjust income (30% Rental rate rule)
- Average IHBG rents are \$300.
- We have identified 120K in rent subsidies and are working on trying to identify additional rental subsidies, focusing on IHBG units first



On-site Programming

- On-site resident services provided through a partnership NAYA and NARA
- Resident services to include:
 - Clinical services including behavioral health services
 - Medical services
 - Dental services
- Recovery focused groups
- Access to NAYA's center-based programming
- Clean and sober building will be included in lease agreement



Recovery Housing:

A focus on drug and alcohol recovery as well as mental supports



How?

- 1. Project funding sources:
 - OHCS/LIFT \$2.24M
 - OHCS/Mental Health \$1.96M
 - LIHTC \$6M
 - Indian Housing Block Grant/Siletz \$1.7M
 - Meyer Memorial Trust \$250,000
 - Citibank loan
 - Rental supports from Home Forward and Joint Office of Homeless Services
- 2. The more funding, the more restrictions



42nd Avenue Business District


- ➤ Our 42nd Ave organization was transferred to NAYA in 2020.
